#### PERFORMANCE OF SELF HELP GROUPS IN ANANTAPUR DISTRICT

#### Introduction:

Self Help Groups are informal associations of people who come together to improve their living conditions with improve of standard of living. Mainly people who are generally similar economic and social status they are combined with help of Non Government Organization or Government to solve their problems. Self Help Group (SHG) is combined with 10 to 25 members with the age of women's between 18 to 40 years. SHGs is nothing but a group of people who are on daily wages, small street vendors, agriculture labourers, weavers etc. they form a group with one president and they will collect savings regularly and give the amount to needed persons. They also some amount save in the banks and collect loans from banks with low interest or no interest lending amount with interest they will pay regularly to the bank. Which groups pay regularly the loan amount they will get incentives like corpus fund, pavala vaddi. In India all most all SHGs linked with banks to get micro credit. Members also make small regular savings contributions over a few months until there is enough money in the group to begin lending. Funds may then be lent back to the members or to others in the village for any purpose. In India, many SHGs are linked with banks for the delivery of micro – credit.

#### Structure

A SHG is a community based group with 10-25 members. They are usually women from similar social and economic backgrounds, all voluntarily coming together to save small sums of money on a regular basis. Taking loans from their collective savings in times of emergency or financial scarcity, important life events or to purchase assets. The bank offer financial services, including collateral free loans to these groups on low interest rates. They allow women to come together and act on issues related to their own lives including health, nutrition and gender issues etc. Self Help Group model was an effective tool for alleviating poverty and unemployment.

#### SHG Bank Linkage Programme

Many self help groups especially in India, SHG bank linkage programme borrow from banks once they have accumulated a base of their own capital. This model has attracted attention as a possible way of delivering micro-finance services to poor populations that have been difficult to reach directly through banks or other institutions. By aggregating their individual savings into a single deposit, self help groups minimize the banks transaction costs and generate an attractive volume of deposits. Through self-help groups, the bank serves small rural depositors while laying them a market rate of interest.

#### Advantages

Poor individual gains strength through groups

SHGs help borrowers overcome the problem of lack of collateral.

Women can discuss their problem and find solutions for their problems.

#### Objectives of the study

- 1. To know the performance of Self Help Groups in Andhra Pradesh
- 2. To know the progress of Self Help Groups in Ananthapurm district

#### Data Base and Methodology

The study is mainly based on secondary data. The secondary data relating to SHG groups, bank linkages, pavala vaddi etc. it was collected from statistical abstract of Andhra Pradesh, Chief planning office Ananthapuramu, reports, journals and other sources.

Table – 1 shows Self Help Group Members category wise (district wise) in Andhra Pradesh. Anantapur district has 662 mandals of this Chittoor district has highest mandals i.e. 66. Lowest mandals in Vizianagaram district i.e. 34 and Anantapur district has 63 mandals. Total SHGs in Andhra Pradesh was 741872. Of 741872 SHGs Anantapur district has 54578, highest SHGs in East Godavari district it was 93210 lowest in Cuddapah district it was 36853. Out of total SHG members other category members was highest share compare to Scheduled caste and Scheduled tribe category. Of total Scheduled caste SHG members in the state Krishna district has highest SC member. Vishakapatnam district has Lowest SHG members in SC category. Ananthapuramu district has 102269 SC members in SHGs.

Out of total Scheduled tribes category SHG members Vishakaptanam district has highest members and lowest in Cuddapah district has lowest members, Ananthapuramu district has 26598 ST members in SHGs. Other category Ananthapuramu district has 436274 (8%) SHG members, East Godavari district has highest members with 13 percent, Nellore district has lowest members i.e. 4 percent. Of total SHG members Ananthapuramu district has 8 percent, East Godavari district was in first place with 13 percent, Cuddapah district was in last place with 5<sup>th</sup> place. Coming to PWD category 14 percent in Ananthapuramu district it is in first place, Cuddaph district was in last place in PWD members in SHGs

Table- 2 indicates that division- wise SHG Bank Linkages in Ananthapuramu district. In Ananthapuramu district total SHGs was decreased from 37410 to 28527 in 2015-16 to 201617 with bank linkage amount increased from 87820 to 97225 lakhs, in 2017-18 to 2018-19. Out of total SHGs Ananthapuramu division has highest number of SHGs with highest number bank linkage amount by SHGs.

In 2015-16 Dharmavaram division has lowest number of SHGs with lowest bank linkage amount. In 2016-17 Kadiri division has lowest number of SHGs with lowest bank linkage amount. In 2017-18 lowest number of SHGs in Darmavaram division but lowest bank linkage amount was in Kalyandurg division. In 2018-19 lowest number of SHGs in Darmavaram division, lowest bank linkage amount was in Kadiri division.

Pavala Vaddi Division wise in Ananthapuram district are shown in Table- 3. In 2015-16 92378 lakhs was taken amount by SHGs as Pavala vaddi. It increased to 54275 (47%) SHGs but pavala vaddi was declined to (-190%) in 2016-17. In 2017-18 total SHGs was declined to 51062 (-6%) with 6442 lakhs amount received by SHGs as pavala vaddi.

In Ananthapuram division 43 percent increases in total number of SHGs but -223 percent declined in Pavala vaddi received by SHGs in 2015-16 to 2016-17. In 2017-18 1 percent increase in number of SHGs but -331 percent declined in Pavala vaddi amount. In Dharmavaram division from 2015-16 to 2016-17 44 percent increased in number of SHGs but -4 percent declined from 2016-17 to 2017-18. SHGs taken amount as pavala vaddi also declined -258 percent in 2015-16 to 2016-17 then -326 percent decrease from 2016-17 to 2017-18. In Penukonda division total number of SHGs was increased from 7077 to 12555 (43%) in 2015-16 to 2016-17 then it declined to 12167 (-3%) in 2017-18.

The SHGs taken amount as pavala vaddi was declined from 22315 to 7352 (-203%) in 2015-16 to 2016-17 then it declined to 1402 (-424%) in 2017-18. In Kalyandurg division total number of SHGs increased from 4706 to 9783 (52%) with decline pavala vaddi amount from 11911 to 5740 lakhs (-107%) inn 2015-16 to 2016-17 then SHGs declined to 8551 (-14%) with 828 (-593%) of pavala vaddi in 2017-18. In Kadiri division number of SHGs increased from 3609 to 8551 (56%) in 2016-17 but it in 2017-18 it was declined to 6726 (-

23%) in 2017-18. Pavala vaddi amount received by SHGs was declined from 11876 to 4880 (-143%) in 2015-16 to 2016-17. Then it declined to 983 (-396%) in 2017-18.

Table- 4 reveals that District-wise Bank Linkage in Andhra Pradesh. In Andhra Pradesh total number of SHGs Target was 522968 with 13697 crores, but outstanding credit to number of SHGs were 576439 with 21959 crores. In Achievement disbursement of SHGs was 502121 with 16938 crores. But outstanding credit was 802978 SHGs with 23218 crores. Percentage of achievement disbursement to number of SHGs was 96 percent with 123 percent amount; outstanding credit was 139 percent SHGs with 105 percent amount.

In target disbursement amount was 1069 crores but outstanding credit was increased to 1790 crores. In achievement disbursement amount was 1326 crores in outstanding credit were increased to 1714 crores. Percentage of achievement of disbursement amount was 124 percent outstanding credit amount was decreased to 96 percent.

Table – 4 indicates mandal –wise SHG bank linkages from 201011 to 201718. In Ananthapur division 5811 SHGs it increased to 13281 SHGs with 122.26 lakhs to 33584.47 lakhs bank linkage amount. In Ananthapur division Ananthapur mandal was highest number of SHGs in 2010-11 to 2017-18 but bank linkage amount was highest in Uravakonda division in 2010-11. In 2017-18 it is highest in Ananthapur division. Lowest number of SHGs in Peddavadugur mandal i.e. 125 in 2010-11. Pamidi mandal was in last place with 395 SHGs in 2017-18. Bank linkage amount was lowest in Singanamala mandal in 2010-11. Peddapappur mandal was lowest in 2017-18.

In Darmavaram division total number of SHGs increased from 2767 with 57.35 lakh amount bank linkages to 4756 SHGs with 15949.38 lakh amount bank linkages. In this division highest number of SHGs in Muddigubba mandal it increased to 482 to 859. Bank linkage amount highest in Darmavaram mandal in 2010-11 but in 2017-18 Chennekotha palli mandal was in first place. Lowest number of SHGs and Lowest amount of bank linkages was in Ramagiri mandal in 2010-11. But in 2017-18 lowest number of SHGs and Lowest bank linkage amount was in Tadimari mandal. In Penukonda division total SHGs was increased from 4182 to 9022 with 74.42 lacks to 24484.89 lacks bank linkage amount. In this division Madakasira mandal was in first place i.e. 490 SHGs with 6.81 lakh bank linkage amount in 2010-11. In 2017-18 Gorantla mandal was in first place with 1038 SHGs but in bank linkage amount was in Roddam mandal i.e. 3376.43 lakhs. Lowest number of SHGs Parigi mandal in 2010-11. It was changed to Rolla mandal in 2017-18. In the bank linkages somandapalli was lowest place in 2010-11 it was changed to Rolla mandal 2017-18.

In Kalyandurg division Kalyandurg mandal has highest number of SHGs with highest amount of bank linkages in 2010-11. In the period of 2017-18 Kanekal mandal has highest number of SHGs with highest amount bank linkages. Total SHGs was increased from 3810 to 6637 with 57.88 lakh amount bank linkages. In this division lowest number of SHGs in Settur mandal with lowest amount of bank linkages in 2010-11. In 2017-18 lowest number of SHGs and bank linkages in Rayadurg mandal.

In Kadiri diviaion total SHGs was increased from 2890 to 5637 with 49.07 lakh amount bank linkages to 13773.43 lakh amount bank linkages. Of this highest number of SHGs in Bukkapatnam mandal i.e. 293 SHGs but bank linkage amount was highest in Kothacheruvu mandal in 2010-11. In 201718 the highest number of SHGs in Kothacheruvu mandal with highest amount of bank linkages. Lowest number of SHgs in Amadagur mandal with lowest amount of bank linkages in 2010-11. In 2017-18 the lowest number of SHGs Gandlapenta mandal with lowest amount of bank linkages.

Mandal- Wise number of SHGs and they received Pavala vaddi in 2010-11 to 2017-18 are shown in Table- 5. In Ananthapurmu division total SHGs was increased from 11094 to 17347 with amount increased from 672.06 lakhs to 2306.84 lakhs received by SHGs as pavala vaddi. In this division Ananthapur mandal was in first place in above two categories. Lowest number of SHGs in Yellanur mandal in 2010-11, in 2017-18 Pamaidi mandal was in last place. In this division Bukkaraya samudram mandal was first place in 2010-11, Ananthpaur mandal was first place in 2017-18, Peddapaappur mandal was last place in 2010-11 & Pamidi mandal was last place in 2017-18 amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi.

In Dharamavaram division Muddigubba mandal has highest number of SHGs Kanaganapalli mandal has lowest number of SHGs. But Darmavaram mandal was in first place & Kanaganapalli mandal was in last place amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi in 2010-11. In 2017-18 highest number of SHGs in Chennekothapalli mandal lowest number of SHGs in Tadimari mandal. Muddigubba mandal was in first place Tadimari mandal was in

last place in amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi. Total SHGs increased from 4461 to 6271 with 299.74 lakhs to 920.61 lakhs amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi.

In Penukonda division total number of SHGs increased from 7210 to 12167 with 319.3 lakhs to 1402.42 lakhs amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi. In this division Madakasira mandal was in first place in number of SHGs i.e. 906 with 45.82 lakh amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi. Agali mandal was last place in number of SHGs i.e. 309 with 6.66 lakhs amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi in 2010-11. In 2017-18 Parigi mandal was in first place with 1445 SHGs Rolla mandal was in last place with 486 SHGs. Pavala vaddi amount received by SHGs Gorantla mandal was in first place with 204.69 lakhs, Rolla mandal was in last place with 37.30 lakhs.

In Kalyandurg division Kambadur mandal was first place, Bommanahal mandal was in last place in number of SHGs in 2010-11. Kundrpi mandal was in first place, Rayadurg mandal was in last place in number of SHGs in 2017-18. In 201011 amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi Kalyandurg mandal received highest amount, Bommanahall mandal received less amount. In 2017-18 Kanekall mandal was in first place Rayadurg mandal was in last place in amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi. In this division total number of SHGs increased from 5082 to 8551 with 203.29 lakhs to 828.93 lakhs amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi.

In Kadiri division total number of SHGs was increased from 5466 to 6726 with 301.87 lakhs to 983.51 lakhs amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi. In this division Puttaparthi mandal has number of SHGs with highest amount received by SHGs as Pavala vaddi. Amadagur mandal was in last place in number of SHGs, Nambulapulla kunta was received less amount as Pavala vaddi by SHGs in 2010-11. In 2017-18 Kothachervuv mandal was in first place in number of SHGs as well as amount received by SHGS as Pavala vaddi. Puttaparthi mandal was in last place in number of SHGs, Gandlapenta mandal was received less amount as Pavala vaddi by SHGs. In Ananthapuramu district total number of SHGs was increased from 33313 to 51062 with 1796.19 lakhs to 6442.31 lakhs amount received by SHGs as Pavalavaddi.
