



Perspectives and Challenges of Rural Development in Rajasthan

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Abstract

Rural development in Rajasthan is evolving from a traditional welfare-oriented approach to a more sustainable, technology-driven, and inclusive development model. The following perspectives explain the future direction and significance of rural development in the state. The 2021-22 period for rural development in Rajasthan was characterized by a strategic pivot toward digital integration and climate resilience, even as it grappled with persistent structural bottlenecks. A major perspective shift was seen through the SVAMITVA Scheme, which began transforming rural asset management by providing property cards via drone surveys, potentially unlocking formal credit for millions. Furthermore, the state leveraged MGNREGS as a primary social safety net, providing critical employment to roughly 1 crore individuals during the post-pandemic recovery phase. However, significant challenges remained, notably the technical and administrative gaps in scheme adoption; studies from this period highlighted that small landholdings and limited awareness among farmers often hindered the effectiveness of initiatives like PM-Kisan and PM-Krishi Sinchayee Yojana. Additionally, the vast geographical diversity—ranging from the arid Thar to tribal belts—led to regional disparities in skill development and job retention, where remote areas faced “last-mile” connectivity issues and infrastructure gaps in health and education facilities.

Introduction

Rural development in Rajasthan during the 2021-22 period represents a critical juncture between traditional agrarian survival and modern institutional reform. Occupying the largest geographical area in India, the state face unique challenges characterized by a fragile ecological balance, recurring droughts, and a highly dispersed population. This period was specifically marked by the aftermath of global health disruptions, which necessitated a dual approach: immediate economic stabilization through robust employment schemes and long-term structural empowerment through technological interventions.

As the state navigated these complexities, the focus shifted toward “Smart Villages,” aiming to bridge the urban-rural divide by improving connectivity, enhancing vocational skills, and promoting climate-resilient agriculture. Understanding the perspectives of this era requires an analysis of how Rajasthan balanced its pioneering heritage in grassroots democracy with the urgent need for contemporary socio-economic modernization.

1. Economic Perspective

Rural Rajasthan contributes significantly to agriculture, animal husbandry, handicrafts, and small-scale industries. From an economic standpoint, the rural development landscape in Rajasthan during 2021-22 was a study in resilience and transition. The state’s rural economy, which contributes significantly to the Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP), faced the dual pressure of stabilizing household incomes post-pandemic and addressing long-term structural vulnerabilities like water scarcity and disguised unemployment in agriculture. Social Agency: By organizing women into SHGs, the state moved beyond simple financial aid. It fostered leadership and collective bargaining power.

The “BC Sakhi” Model: Women were trained as Business Correspondents, bringing banking services to the doorstep of rural households. This not only improved financial access but also elevated the social status of women in traditionally patriarchal settings. The COVID-19 pandemic's lingering effects in early 2021-22 forced a social re-evaluation of rural education. The government expanded these Mahatma Gandhi English Medium Schools: schools to rural areas to bridge the social gap between urban private schooling and rural public education. Programs like SMILE (Social Media Interface for Learning Engagement) aimed to keep rural students connected. However, this period also highlighted the social challenge of the "digital divide," where households without smartphones faced educational exclusion.

3. Agricultural Perspective

Agriculture remains the backbone of Rajasthan's rural economy. The agricultural landscape in Rajasthan during 2021-22 was defined by a strategic shift toward climate-resilient farming and technological integration. Given that a significant portion of the state's population relies on agriculture, the focus moved beyond just production to sustainability and farmer income security. A milestone for the 2021-22 period was the decision to present a separate Agriculture Budget. This signaled a prioritized focus on the primary sector, aiming to address the specific needs of farmers—such as power subsidies, irrigation, and seed availability—distinct from general state expenditures.
